Coopers Lane Primary School September 2020 Returning to School Protocol and Procedures



In line with the Department for Education's instruction, it is our plan that all pupils, in all year groups, will return to school full-time from the beginning of the autumn term – Thursday 3rd September (2nd September is an INSET day)

Our planning is underpinned by the Department for Education's advice on effective infection protection and control which states the following:

"We are asking schools to prepare for all pupils to return full-time from the start of the autumn term, including those in school-based nurseries. Schools should not put in place rotas.

Schools must comply with health and safety law, which requires them to assess risks and put in place proportionate control measures. Schools should thoroughly review their health and safety risk assessments and draw up plans for the autumn term that address the risks identified using the system of controls set out below. These are an adapted form of the system of protective measures that will be familiar from the summer term. Essential measures include:

- 1. a requirement that people who are ill stay at home
- 2. robust hand and respiratory hygiene
- 3. enhanced cleaning arrangements
- 4. active engagement with NHS Test and Trace
- 5. formal consideration of how to reduce contacts and maximise distancing between those in school wherever possible and minimise potential for contamination so far as is reasonably practicable

How contacts are reduced will depend on the school's circumstances and will (as much as possible) include:

- grouping children together
- · avoiding contact between groups
- arranging classrooms with forward facing desks
- staff maintaining distance from pupils and other staff as much as possible"

Many of the protocols and procedures that were implemented during the summer term will remain the same in the autumn term with the expectation that they will further embed so that children who did not attend in the summer term will themselves adopt the measures also.

All protocol and procedures are aligned to the Risk Assessment of Schools document (to be published on the school website at the beginning of September) that has been produced using a LA-approved template following 'Guidance for full opening: schools' (https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/actions-for-schools-during-the-coronavirus-outbreak/guidance-for-full-opening-schools#introduction). It is a legal requirement to review and update the previous risk assessment.

"The following plan outlines relevant detail from the government's guidance with further detail about how Coopers Lane Primary School will adopt measures and ensure compliance to the statutory elements within. The aim of this plan is to minimise the risks, whilst acknowledging that we can't negate them entirely."

All elements of the system of controls are essential. All schools must cover them all, but the way different schools implement some of the requirements will differ based on their individual circumstances...The system of controls provides a set of principles to help them do this and, if schools follow this advice, they will effectively minimise risks.

Within the government guidance, the systems of control that schools should adopt are clearly listed. This document will outline those systems of control and how Coopers Lane Primary School has made them appropriate to our specific context and circumstance.

"System of controls

This is the set of actions schools must take. They are grouped into 'prevention' and 'response to any infection' and are outlined in more detail in the sections below.

Prevention:

- 1) minimise contact with individuals who are unwell by ensuring that those who have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, or who have someone in their household who does, do not attend school
- 2) clean hands thoroughly more often than usual
- 3) ensure good respiratory hygiene by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach
- **4)** introduce enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often, using standard products such as detergents and bleach
- 5) minimise contact between individuals and maintain social distancing wherever possible
- 6) where necessary, wear appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE)

Numbers 1 to 4 must be in place in all schools, all the time.

Number 5 must be properly considered and schools must put in place measures that suit their particular circumstances.

Number 6 applies in specific circumstances.

Response to any infection:

- 7) engage with the NHS Test and Trace process
- 8) manage confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) amongst the school community
- 9) contain any outbreak by following local health protection team advice

Numbers 7 to 9 must be followed in every case where they are relevant."

Numbers 7-9 above may require school to share pupil/parent contact information with public health officials. This sharing of information is permissible under current law and is in line with data protection guidance covering schools.

Systems of control

Action

Prevention

1. Minimise contact with individuals who are unwell by ensuring that those who have coronavirus (COVID-19) symptoms, or who have someone in their household who does, do not attend school

If a member of staff, pupil, parent or any other adult show symptoms of Coronavirus or they have tested positive within the last 7 days, **they are not to attend school**. The symptoms have been communicated with all members of the school community on multiple occasions and will be shared again before the autumn term.

If an adult becomes unwell, they are to remove themselves from the setting as soon as possible.

If a child in the setting becomes unwell, the existing guidelines will be followed i.e. the child will be removed to a designated isolated space where they can be monitored and supported until they are collected by their parents or carers. The room that the child utilised will be immediately cleaned and the children/adults will wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds.

In terms of PPE, a face mask should be worn by the supervising adult if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained. If contact with the child or young person is necessary, then disposable gloves, a disposable apron and a face mask should be worn by the supervising adult. If a risk assessment determines that there is a risk of splashing to the eyes, for example from coughing, spitting, or vomiting, then eye protection should also be worn. The member of staff supporting the symptomatic child does not need to go home to self-isolate unless they develop symptoms themselves or if the symptomatic child subsequently tests positive or they have been requested to do so by NHS Test and Trace.

There will also be a designated toilet assigned to children who fall ill. Once the child is collected, both rooms (waiting and toilet if used) will be thoroughly cleaned by a member of staff wearing both gloves and a mask.

The designated isolation spaces/toilets are as follows;

- Elephant and Castle (Deputy Head Teacher's office) and disabled toilet next door
- Centre for the Deaf office and disabled toilet next door

The child should then be tested for coronavirus. If the test is negative the child can return to the setting assuming they are well enough. If the test is positive, all children and adults within that bubble should self-isolate for 14 days and not attend the setting. This is why it is so important to not mix with other children and adults outside of your bubble – it is a protective mechanism. This guidance also applies if an adult presents as unwell and is subsequently tested as positive.

Prevention

Clean hands thoroughly more often than usual. Adults and children are to wash/sanitise their hands on the following occasions:

- Entry to school
- Before/after break times
- Before lunch
- When they change rooms
- Before leaving school
- Anytime that they visit the toilet or cough/sneeze in to their hands.

Additional hand sanitisers pumps have been purchased and are stationed in each classroom as well as additional hand sanitisers at appropriate points in school i.e. the reception desk for visitors and staff upon arrival and the photocopying areas for increased hygiene as a 'pinch point' in the school.

Where children are struggling to wash independently they may receive support assuming the adult supporting is also washing their hands. Children may also use moisturiser supplied from home when required.

Hand hygiene protocols are to be re-visited at the start of the year when the children will receive reminders about the expectations of practices and protocols in school. They will be established as part of our culture and behaviour expectations.

Prevention

3. Ensure good respiratory hygiene by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach.

At the start of the term in September children will be reminded of the posters around school that encourage them to catch it, bin it and kill it. Children will be reminded that if tissues are regularly disposed of throughout the day, they should be thrown in to the lidded bins in each classroom and their hands must be cleaned afterwards.

Where pupils struggle to maintain as good respiratory hygiene as their peers (spitting etc) they will need an individual risk assessment to ensure measures can be put in place to reduce the risks. This is not a reason to deny these pupils face-to-face education.

Prevention

4. Introduce enhanced cleaning, including cleaning frequently touched surfaces often, using standard products such as detergents and bleach

At various intervals (as per the cleaning schedule), adults will disinfect and clean tables, door handles and equipment. Each class bubble will have their own allotted set of classroom cleaning equipment in a caddy. It will be stored appropriately within the classrooms.

Children should be allowed to go to the toilet as they would do in a normal school day, however staff need to be very aware of how many other children are also using the toilet and ensure that children wash their hands afterwards. Toilets are to be cleaned regularly.

If we are required to clean an area after a positive case of coronavirus has been identified, we must follow the guidelines

(healthcare-settings/covid-19-decontamination-in-non-healthcare-settings). This includes ensuring that all tissues, PPE, and cleaning materials are put in a separate disposal bag that is stored securely for 72 hours before being disposed of.

Prevention

 Minimise contact between individuals and maintain social distancing wherever possible. The purpose of 'bubbles' is to minimise contacts and mixing between people, reducing the transmission of coronavirus. Coopers Lane Primary School will do everything it can to maintain this whilst still delivering a broad and balanced curriculum. Within bubbles, children and adults must also take measures to distance themselves where at all possible.

Grouping the Children

There has been recognition from the DfE that children cannot distance themselves from staff or from each other. Bubbles provide an additional protective measure and they make it quicker and easier to identify those who need to self-isolate as a result of a positive test result.

The DfE guidance reads as follows:

"In this guidance for the autumn term, maintaining consistent groups remains important, but given the decrease in the prevalence of coronavirus (COVID-19) and the resumption of the full range of curriculum subjects, schools may need to change the emphasis on bubbles within their system of controls and increase the size of these groups."

In order for school to offer a curriculum that is best-placed to support the children our bubbles will need to be in year groups. The reasons for this are as follows:

- All children will be able to be considered for interventions now that teaching support can work across the year group. There would not be enough adults to support individual class bubbles.
- In order to deliver a full curriculum, it is sometimes necessary to share resources across a year group. There would not be enough resources to support a broad curriculum if we used individual class bubbles.
- Staggered entry/exit times and break/lunch times can be managed more effectively in year group bubbles rather than having 21 individual start/finish times, which is just not manageable.

Within the government guidance, it recognises that younger children will not be able to maintain social distancing, and it is acceptable for them not to distance within their group. This has implications for NHS Test and Trace should there be the need to contact parents of children as a result of a positive case. The guidance also advises that siblings may be in different groups and encourages schools to use measures as best they can as it will still reduce the network of possible direct transmission.

All teachers and other staff can operate across different classes and year groups in order to facilitate the delivery of the curriculum, however we will keep this to a minimum.

Measures within the classroom

Adults are to encourage children to maintain a distance between one another whilst inside and reduce the amount of time that they are in face-to-face contact with one another. Where circumstances allow, adults are to try to distance from children and one another.

Children with additional needs should receive as much support as normal but adults are to be extra vigilant and mindful of their face-to-face time with the children and reduce this where possible.

Classrooms need to be adapted to support distancing where possible. If tables are used, they should face the front and children should sit side-by-side, not facing one another nor side on. Classrooms will be prepared as such ready for September.

Measures elsewhere

There will be no whole-school events where children and adults are required to congregate. Assemblies will be limited to year group assemblies. Children will be required to distance during these assemblies rather than lining in tight rows. Where possible, efforts will be made to have virtual assemblies through Zoom (video conference software). Children are not to sing during assembly.

There will continue to be a second temporary staff room set up in the Gym for use by all staff working in EYFS and KS1 (which will be accessed by walking under the canopy outside KS1 building and entering via the door of the Gym opposite Embankment class). Staff working in KS2 should use the staff room in the KS2 building. Breaks will be on a rota so there should be limited staff in each staff room at any point.

Use of the staff rooms should be minimal and strict social distancing must be in place where possible. It is important for your own wellbeing that you see colleagues but please do not contravene social distancing measures otherwise multiple groups could be at risk of infection should anyone present with symptoms.

Measures for arriving at and leaving school (inc break/lunch times)

The start and end time of school will be as follows:

Nursery am: 8:30am – 11:30am Nursery pm: 12:30pm – 3:30pm Reception: 8.45am – 3:15pm Key Stage 1: 8:50am – 3:20pm

Lower Key Stage 2 (Y3/4): 8:30am – 3:00pm Upper Key Stage 2 (Y5/6): 8:40am – 3:10pm

Parents MUST arrive at the designated time for drop-off and collection. Do not arrive early as there will be nowhere to wait, and do not arrive late as this impacts on other families and their ability to social distance. Staggering entrance/collection will ensure that the adults and children on site can distance appropriately and it will reduce the risk of children coming in to contact with children from other bubbles. This will be difficult for some families of multiple children.

Parents are to be encouraged to walk to school where possible and only one parent will be permitted on the school grounds. If children cycle or scooter to school, then they are to use the storage area closest to their class to store their bike/scooter.

Members of the Leadership Team will be on the school gates to support children and adults as they arrive at school. The one-way system currently in place will

continue throughout the Autumn Term. This way we will continue to reduce footfall of adults on site. Parents mustn't congregate at the 'drop-off' points, they must instead arrive on time and then depart.

Parents of Nursery children are to enter as normal, using the Nursery entrance and then exit through the KS1 playground following the one-way system. Parents must arrive on time for entry to school, they must not arrive early or late. In the instance that parents have children in more than one year group, parents must drop off all children at the first drop-off time given to the family.

When collecting children at the end of the day the one-way system will be used. Parents must not arrive early or late. They must collect their children on time so that teachers can release children safely. Whilst parents are collecting, social distancing must be adhered to. In the instance that parents have children in more than one year group, parents must collect all children at the first collection time given to the family. Further details on drop-off and collection times will be sent to parents before the start of the new term.

Teachers will not be available to speak to parents unless they initiate the contact. Teachers must commit their time to ensuring that all children safely leave their care. Parents can contact teachers through the school office if they have queries about the day or wish to make a phone appointment.

The school office is not to be accessed by parents unless through prior arrangement via a call or email. The office will not be open for parents to drop-in to. The DfE guidance states that coming into the site without an appointment is not allowed. However, parents can obviously still call and receive support over the phone or via email. Mobile phones should not be brought into school by the children unless specific permission has been given to do so as a result of them travelling to and from school by themselves. In this instance mobile phones will be stored in class bubble containers in the school office. The container to be taken and collected by a member of school staff within that bubble.

Any homemade or non-disposable face coverings that staff or children, young people or other learners are wearing when they arrive at their setting must be removed by the wearer and placed into a plastic bag that the wearer has brought with them in order to take it home. Disposable face-coverings must be placed in a lidded bin. The wearer must then clean their hands.

Other considerations

Supply teachers, peripatetic teachers and/or other temporary staff can move between schools. Likewise specialists, therapists, clinicians and other support staff for pupils with SEND should provide interventions as usual. However, they must be made aware of school procedures and they must adhere to them. A pamphlet of these will be provided alongside the normal safeguarding procedures.

Where contractors can attend outside of school hours they should. If that is not possible, they should follow all procedures as determined by school.

A record of all visitors must be kept to support NHS Test and Trace.

In terms or classroom resources, for regularly used stationery, children will all have their own individual set that is not to be shared. Other classroom resources like books and games can be used within the bubble but should be cleaned following use.

Shared resources, like art/science equipment should be cleaned between use or rotated to allow 72 hours between use to ensure they are safe.

For playtimes and lunchtimes, children should be encouraged to play games that have distancing and little touch. Each class bubble will have a small set of resources from their classrooms or the PE cupboard so that they have dedicated outdoor equipment that is taken out and used exclusively by them. This is gathered back in at the end of their break/ lunch time and cleaned.

Pupils should not bring anything additional from home. There can be no 'show and tell'. However, children can now take reading books home and return them as normal. Reading books are to be returned as normal but taken out of circulation for 72 hours before being returned to the class library.

Teachers can now take books home (and return them freely) to assess or use to support planning etc. This is also true of library books.

Prevention

6. Where necessary, wear appropriate personal protective equipment (PPE).

PPE should only be used for two reasons; where an individual is presenting with coronavirus symptoms and/or when a child is receiving intimate care (toileting/relevant first aid support).

The PPE available in school for dealing with cleaning of potentially infected zones and supporting ill children or adults is as follows:

- Face masks
- Aprons
- Gloves of various sizes
- Face shields (limited quantities)

Children need to know that some adults might be wearing PPE and that it is 'ok'.

Response to any infection

Parents and staff will be informed that they are expected to engage in the NHS Test and Trace process if required to do so.

7. Engage with NHS Test and Trace.

They will be required to book a test and provide details of anyone that they have been in close contact with. They will then be obliged to follow the 'stay at home' regulations.

Anyone who displays symptoms of coronavirus can and should get a test following the flowchart response.

If school thinks that the family of the symptomatic child/adult is unlikely to book a test appropriately, we will provide a home testing kit. We should receive these before the start of the autumn term and they will be stored in the School Office. Given the potential low numbers of kits, they will only be issued where absolutely necessary and with the agreement of a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

	School must provide the details of those children/adults that have been in direct close contact with the child/adult (face-to-face contact for any length of time); proximity contacts (extended close contact – within 1m-2m for more than 15 minutes); travelling in a small vehicle with the infected person.			
	The admin team will prepare a report that shows the contact details of each member of the phase bubbles to support the contact tracers.			
	School will inform parents of the infection, according to the flowchart, but we will not reveal the name of the infected child/adult.

At that point the household will need to go in to full isolation following stay at home guidance and have the test. If the symptomatic child's test is negative, they must continue to isolate for the remainder of the 14 days. Children are expected to complete work provided by the school whilst in isolation.

Aspect of school

Transport

There is a distinction between dedicated school transport and wider public transport:

- by dedicated school transport, we mean services that are used only to carry pupils to school. This includes statutory home to school transport, but may also include some existing or new commercial travel routes, where they carry school pupils only
- by public transport services, we mean routes which are also used by the general public

Attendance

Now the circumstances have changed and it is vital for all children to return to school to minimise as far as possible the longer-term impact of the pandemic on children's education, wellbeing and wider development.

School attendance will therefore be mandatory again from the beginning of the autumn term.

Dedicated school transport

Pupils on dedicated school services do not mix with the general public on those journeys and tend to be consistent. This means that the advice for passengers on public transport to adopt a social distance of two metres from people outside their household or support bubble, or a 'one metre plus' approach where this is not possible, will not apply from the autumn term on dedicated transport. Therefore, school trips using coaches can still occur as long as the children travel in their consistent bubbles.

If children are travelling via coach to a trip, for example, they are expected to adhere to the systems of control still i.e. good hand hygiene and distancing where possible. However, we are not currently planning any trips for the Autumn Term.

School will only use travel companies who can share a policy that outlines their commitment to thoroughly cleaning coaches between use.

Wider public transport

Children should not attend trips or visits if they are required to use public transport to get there. This seems like an unnecessary risk for Coopers Lane Primary School to instigate.

Attendance expectations

School will communicate the necessity of attending school to parents and where required, we will offer additional pastoral support.

School will re-establish attendance routines as before i.e. we will continue to record and monitor attendance as we did pre-Covid and any absence will be followed up.

Where appropriate, we will engage with the local authority to further support any families with non-attending pupils.

Pupils who are shielding or self-isolating

If rates of infection in the local area rise, then some parents who have children who were once shielding due to medical advice may wish to isolate their children again.

Where children can't attend school as parents are following clinical and/or public health advice, absence will not be penalised.

Pupils and families who are anxious about return to school

If any parents have serious concerns about their child returning to school, we will provide an opportunity to discuss the safety at school and the procedures in place in an attempt to provide reassurance – this could be via a Zoom meeting.

The school has identified vulnerable families who may need this additional support. Regular contact has been made through the summer term and this will continue throughout the autumn term.

School Workforce

Staff who are clinically vulnerable or extremely clinically vulnerable

Coopers Lane Primary School has planned to follow the full measures within the guidance, therefore most staff will return to the workplace as normal.

Those members of staff that received a letter to say that they were extremely vulnerable and advising them to shield can also return as normal given that shielding comes to a close on 1st August. However, those adults will be encouraged to maintain social distancing measures as much as possible when in attendance.

People who live with those who are clinically extremely vulnerable or clinically vulnerable can attend school as normal also.

Deploying support staff and accommodating visiting specialists

As per government guidance, teaching assistants may be deployed to lead groups or cover lessons under the direction and supervision of a qualified, or nominated, teacher. This will become an important measure to reduce the necessity of bringing in agency staff and compromising the integrity of bubbles, should there be a need to arrange cover for any reason.

Supply teachers and other temporary or peripatetic teachers

Supply teachers will be used as a last resort to cover bubbles, however if required they will need to maintain stringent distancing.

Likewise, HW Skills sports coaches, music tutors and the French teacher will be permitted to teach various groups of children assuming that they are able to follow stringent distancing also. These will need to be consistent people, not changing week-to-week.

Staff taking leave

The government has set a requirement that people returning from some countries will be required to quarantine for 14 days.

Where staff are required to quarantine after returning from holidays, they need to understand that any period of absence is not authorised given that they are knowingly becoming absent from work. No home-working role is available to those adults therefore staff would be determined as being absent without leave.

Safeguarding

All existing pre-Covid safeguarding measures will return as normal, however the Safeguarding Team will need to consider additional time to 'catch-up' with those children requiring additional pastoral support as a result of prolonged absence from school.

Catering

The expectation is that the school kitchen will be fully open in the Autumn term. However, it is extremely challenging to offer hot meals to all children while following distancing guidelines. In order to do this we have had to adjust our normal timings (see below). To start the term, any full time Nursery children who require a school lunch will be provided with a packed lunch that will be eaten in the Nursery.

All meals will take in to account dietary requirements as the kitchen normally would.

Lunch and break times

Midday supervisors will continue to support the supervision of lunchtimes but they will be allocated to year group bubbles that cannot mix.

A rota will be drawn up to ensure that only members of staff within appropriate bubbles supervise their bubbles at break times. The playground will be split in to zones and allocated to bubbles to avoid any cross-contamination.

Timings of lunchtimes will be staggered, as will break times:

Break times

➤ Year 1: 10:45 – 11:00

➤ Year 2: 10:15 – 10:30

➤ Year 3: 10:15 – 10:30

Year 4: 10:45 – 11:00

➤ Year 5: 11:00 – 11:15

Year 6: 10:30 - 10:45

Lunch times

➤ Nursery: 11:30 – 12:30 (packed lunch to be eaten in Nursery)

➤ Reception: 11:30 – 12:30

Year 1: 12:30 – 1:30

➤ Year 2: 11:30 – 12:30

Year 3: 12:30 - 1:30Year 4: 11:30 - 12:30

➤ Year 5: 12:50 – 1:50

/ Teal 3. 12.30 - 1.30

➤ Year 6: 12:30 – 1:30

All children will have a 1 hour lunch break and within this time there will be a staggered slot in the lunch hall. The rest of the time will be spent in the playground with the class bubble in a designated zone.

On some occasions, support staff may be required to help to supervise the children whilst they eat and then support in cleaning the room before children go out for their playtime.

Estates

Mr Teasdale and Mr Chalmers will conduct the normal pre-term building checks as per the existing schedule of work.

Teachers need to ensure that classrooms have good ventilation (open windows and doors).

Educational Visits	There will be no educational trips during the Autumn Term.
Wraparound care	Wraparound care (Breakfast Club and After School Tea Club) is permitted to commence in September. Children attending wrap around care will ideally need to be kept in separate year group bubbles. However, that might not be possible due to limited staff numbers and children attending, therefore the children will need to remain in small consistent bubbles, observing very good hand hygiene.

Section 3: Curriculum, behaviour and pastoral support

Aspect	of	school	

Curriculum expectations

The key principles that underpin government advice on curriculum planning are:

Education is not optional: all pupils receive a highquality education that promotes their development and prepares them for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of later life.

The curriculum remains broad and ambitious: all pupils continue to be taught a wide range of subjects, maintaining their choices for further study and employment.

Remote education, where needed, is high quality and aligns as closely as possible with in-school provision: schools and other settings continue to build their capability to educate pupils remotely, where this is needed.

Action

Coopers Lane Primary School will not have a 'recovery curriculum'. We will instead apply our curriculum model in its fullest and identify gaps in core learning that need to be negated over a period of time, with additional intervention where needed.

During September, children will be reminded of all of their hard work during the previous year and we will remind them of the expectations so that they know what we are expecting of them on their return to school i.e. great learning behaviours, school values.

Our September 2020 curriculum will be as planned. This includes our updated History and Geography topics and the implementation of our new Relationships, Health and Sex Education policy.

Formative assessment will be used to a greater extent so that teachers can tailor the learning to the needs of the children.

Remote education will become a focus in the sense that it will become integrated in to the school curriculum when it is needed. Google Classroom will be used in school throughout the curriculum so that children are comfortable with using it in readiness to reverting to that way of working should local lockdowns or a national lockdown be imposed.

Specific points for early years foundation stage (EYFS) to key stage 2	For children in nursery settings, teachers should focus on the prime areas of learning, including: communication and language, personal, social and emotional development (PSED) and physical development. For pupils in Reception, teachers should also assess and address gaps in language, early reading and mathematics, particularly ensuring children's acquisition of phonic knowledge and extending their vocabulary. Settings should follow updates to the EYFS disapplication guidance. For nursery settings and Reception, consider how all groups of children can be given equal opportunities for outdoor learning. For pupils in key stages 1 and 2, school leaders are expected to prioritise identifying gaps and re-establish good progress in the essentials (phonics and reading, increasing vocabulary, writing and mathematics), identifying opportunities across the curriculum so they read widely, and developing their knowledge and vocabulary. The curriculum should remain broad, so that the majority of pupils are taught a full range of subjects over the year, including sciences, humanities, the arts, physical education/sport, religious education and relationships and health education.
Music	Given that there could be an additional risk of infection in environments where children and adults are singing, chanting, playing wind and brass instruments or shouting, singing should not happen in groups of more than 15 and when it does take place, children need to be side-by-side and not facing one another. This has implications for our music curriculum and adjustments will need to be made.
Physical activity in schools	PE lessons are still to take place. Where possible, they are to take place outside as transmission of the disease is reduced in the outdoors. The systems of control will still need to be applied during these sessions. Pupils will be kept in consistent groups and sports equipment will be cleaned thoroughly between each use by different groups. Hand hygiene and respiratory hygiene is paramount due to the nature of exercising and the way people breathe as a result. Hands must be washed thoroughly after completing a PE session. Contact sports are to be avoided. External coaches can still be used to deliver PE sessions as long as they also follow the protective measures.
Pastoral support	The Learning Mentors will ensure that appropriate materials are on hand to support children's wellbeing. PSHE sessions will need to provide children with the opportunity to rebuild friendships and social engagement and address issues linked to coronavirus. Where issues arise, the Learning Mentors are to be informed so that specific interventions can take place. They will need to ensure that they distance appropriately during meetings (outside preferably) given that they will be required to work across phases.
Behaviour expectations	The current approved behaviour policy coronavirus amendment will still apply. During September, expectations of behaviour will be revisited and the school's values will be widely discussed so that the ethos of the school does not change. The climate and culture needs to remain one of high expectations and respect for one another.

A local outbreak	If school is made aware of a local outbreak, the PHE health protection team or the local authority may advise school to close. Preparations will be made by way of a contingency plan so that learning can still continue and the community can remain safe.		
Remote education support	Coopers Lane Primary School needs to be in the position to offer immediate remote education if there was a local outbreak and subsequent lockdown. Our immediate response will be the following:		
	 Children are to take home their individual stationery packs and an exercise book Adults will share lessons via Google Classroom, often in reference to Oak National Academy lessons that are tailored for every objective in the primary curriculum (EYFS coming soon). Children will be given individual logins and be expected to submit their work each day. Children will be able to take photos of their learning and upload to the Google Classroom so that teachers can monitor progress and offer supportive feedback if appropriate. On a weekly basis there will be a virtual class assembly and a small group circle time. All parents and children must follow the Zoom protocol for such meetings. Chosen learning activities will follow our curriculum sequencing and will be of high quality. All teachers will use this consistently to support online learning. More detail

Where children can't access the internet, children will receive home-learning packs (paper-based) to complete. However, efforts will be made to ensure vulnerable/disadvantaged families are not further disadvantaged by their lack of technology in the household. The existing devices will be re-distributed to those eligible families.

The principles for delivery will be as follows:

- Children will receive learning opportunities for a range of subjects each day
- Learning will be sequenced as per our current curriculum model
- ➤ High quality explanations will be made by the teacher using video links from school or through curriculum resources such as Oak National
- Work will be checked through uploads to Google Classroom
- > Teachers will be available via Gmail so that they can further support children.
- ➤ Oak National content that specialises in SEND will be offered accordingly, alongside packages made available through the learning support team.
